Archery Archives

The legendary..."Chief" Will Compton



"Chief" William John
Compton was born in Flint,
Michigan in 1862. Will
Compton moved to Norfold,
Nebraska at age 7 where he
was "adopted" by Sioux Indians. Will moved to California around 1900, living
there the remainder of his
life. He became an expert
bowyer and archer and was
responsible for the introduction of modern archery to the

west. Primarily a bowhunter, the Chief killed his first deer at age 14 and bowhunted for 30 years before Ishi, the last wild Yana Indian, introduced primitive archery to Dr. Saxton Pope. Pope credits Will with taking numerous small game, bird in flight, many deer, elk, moose and even a buffalo with a bow. Compton and Pope shot with Ishi until his last illness. Will Compton was the man who brought Pope and Art Young together and taught them archery. After Ishi's death the three shot and hunted together many times. The "Chief" imparted his wisdom of hunting and a love for the primitive use of the bow on these fine pioneers of our sport..

In 1947, the National Field Archery Association recognized "Chief" Compton's contributions through its highest award, the NFAA Medal of Honor, "which shall be known as the Compton Medal of Honor and it shall be bestowed sparingly and only in recognition of outstanding and unselfish contributions to Archery in any of its phases." Chief Will Compton died of a heart attack suddenly on May 16, 1938.

Recovering from treestand accidents

The Headlines from early this past bow season read:

Man Dies after falling out of his tree stand

"A man is dead after falling out of his tree stand while hunting. Deputies in Taylor County found the 65-year-old man at 1:30 this afternoon north of Owen. Someone called 911 saying they found a hunter in the woods that appeared to be dead. Investigators say the man was bear hunting and fell 16feet out of his tree stand. They say he was not wearing a restraining device and no foul play is suspected. "

t makes sense that a safety harness is TOP PRIORITY when hunting from an elevated position. But there are more considerations in the event your harness has already done its job to restrain you after a fall. It is highly critical that you are able to get back in your stand after you've fallen. Most hunters fail to give consideration to what to do after they have fallen out and are suspended. Heed these tips and stay alive out there:

Once in your tree stand, your tether should be secured to the tree high enough so it tugs on

you when you sit down on your seat. You should be able to lean forward slightly while sitting. To do this, I place my tether at least at eye level or higher while standing and facing the tree. The higher the tether, the faster it will catch you, and suspend you

within reach of your tree stand. It also reduces the trauma from a bounce. Do this to ensure you're within reach of your tree stand. After a fall, the tether will stretch and your harness will tighten upwards on your torso when you fall. A higher tether provides a safer swinging point above your torso which allows you to move freely in your stand as well.

Position your safety line on the side of the tether where you prefer to fall and hang. A safety line connected to your tether a few inches to your right will swing you out to the right and suspend you to the right of the stand. Whatever side you choose, makes

sure this is directly opposite from the side of the tree containing your climbing sticks or tree steps to avoid serious injury from crashing into them! This way you are suspended within reach of your stand so you can climb back on safely.

"Suspension trauma" can kill you by cutting the circulation signs of suspension trauma include dizziness and fatigue. Eventually you will "black out" and die if you remain ever you do, just do not panic. Think!

If you use a climbing tree stand as I do, you can carefully lift the platform up and adjust it to allow safe re-entry. If you do not already make a habit of having connector ropes between your climbing and platform sections, start now to prevent losing your platform in mid-air!







In case you are unable to get back aboard your tree stand consider this: I always carry my cell phone TURNED ON (on vibrate) in the chest pocket of my jacket or Hunter Safety System harness for easy access. Don't drop it!

Either call someone who knows right where you are or call 911 and calmly give clear instructions as to your situation and location, and stay on the phone only if you are if you are already using a tension relief strap! If not, get the tension relief strap out now, then call!

If you do not have a cell phone, carry a whistle in that pocket. A strap-on tree step is not a bad item to put in one of your pockets either. Strap it to low to the tree and use it to step on and relieve the suspension trauma by alternating what foot you step onto it with. Better yet, get a tension relief strap and tie the loose end to your harnesses "lineman rope D-ring." Put your foot in the loop and stand up to relieve tension, occasionally switching feet.

You can use your free arms to orient your body to face your tree stand and carefully lift one leg out from your suspension relief strap and bring your knee up onto the platform and climb up on onto it. Now you may call your friend/family member and tell them your status and if additional help is needed.

If you fell from a fixed position tree stand you won't be able to adjust your platform but you may be able to reach your climbing sticks or tree steps, if the tree is not to big. Reach for them and try to pull yourself over to them around the "back" of the tree (opposite from your platform). You may have to pull yourself upwards simultaneously to create enough slack in the safety line to circle the tree. If you do not have enough line to get around pull out a screw-in or strap-on tree step to place so you can hoist yourself up to your stand.





Old School Archery Articles

Gleaned by Ray Tareila

Last issue we had the first installment of archery articles gleaned from my decent collection of old magazines and books. Fred Bear's article of 1941 on arrow weight vs bow weight vs penetration is even more valid today after all the proofs offered by Dr. Ashby in his recent articles.

Today we go to "Ye Sylvan Archer" of July, 1942 to an article entitled: "Etymologically Speaking." This is for all you egghead toxophilites! I have to admit, I are one. However, you will eventually catch the subtle humor laced throughout!

"Probably there are few devotees of the bow and arrow who realize the relationship between archery and toxicology. We hear the terms *toxin* and *antitoxin* freely used. We may be so unfortunate as to be afflicted with *toxaemia*. We may hear the medical men talking of *toxicosis*. We may have read or at least know of Roger Ascham's "Toxophilus." We know something of the Royal Toxophilite Society of England. But probably few of us know of the definite etymological relationship

existing between the toxicologist and the toxophilite. However, the toxophilite is a direct descendant of the old Greek word, *toxon*, which meant "bow, arrow," according to our old friend Webster, while the toxicologist is sort of a second cousin twice removed. Still under the authority of Webster, the Greek word *toxon* became *toxicon*, meaning "poison for smearing arrows."

The Romans borrowed the word from the Greeks along with many other more or less useful properties of their Greek neighbors, just as the modern counterparts of the Romans, the Italians, would like to borrow the property and lands of their neighbors. [note: remember this article was written during WW-II]. So the Romans used the word *toxicum*, meaning

"poison," and from this term comes our family of *toxins*, ranging from the little but powerful and notorious *toxic* to the big and irritable *toxicodendron*, the poison –ivy.

And then there is *antitoxin*, hardly a blood relative, but related etymologically; maybe we could call her tribe the in-laws of the *toxins*, for they are ever at outs with them.


Then there is another branch of the family, the *intoxication* crowd, sometimes unwelcome friends at hunting camp, as they stagger foolishly around. Too bad they can claim any kinship with the *toxophilite* group because they cast a shadow upon the good name of the true descendants of *toxon*, true descendants because the word *toxophile* is a result of the

marriage of the old Greek toxon, the bow and philos, loving. In preparing this learned dissertation we have consulted Liddell and Scott's Greek-English Lexicon at length, and were surprised at the prolificacy of the old Greek toxon family. These authors tell us that the Homeric bow was of two pieces of horn joined by the pechus in the middle. They tell us also that the Greeks had a word, derived from toxon, for famous bowmakers like Capt. Styles, a word for noted archers like Larry Hughes, as distinguished from the garden-run of archers, and various other words to

indicate the lesser and greater lights of the bow and arrow fraternity.

So, the *toxophilites* came to this country from ancient Greece by way of England and the toxins arrived by way of Italy after a notorious sojourn there, where, as stated above, they were known as the *toxicums*, and were mixed up with numerous murder rings and assassination plots".

Orange-Curry Antelope

INGREDIENTS:

1 1/2 lb. Antelope Steak

3-4 Tbsp. Margarine

2 Green Onions—thinly sliced

1 tsp. Curry Powder

1/4 tsp. Ginger

2 Tbsp. Honey

1 1/2 Tbsp. Soy Sauce

1 Cup Orange Juice

1 Cup Water (reserve 1/4 cup to mix with cornstarch

2 Tbsp. Cornstarch

Remove all bone & fat from the Antelope steaks. Slice the meat into thin, bite-sized strips. Partially frozen meat is easier to trim & slice. In a large skillet or electric fry pan, melt two Tbsp. of margarine and fry the meat strips about 5 minutes. Remove meat from pan with a slotted spoon and set aside. In same pan, melt one to two Tbsp. margarine and stir-fry onions and curry powder for about two minutes.

Combine ginger, honey, soy sauce, orange juice and 3/4 cup of water and add to fry pan. Return meat to pan and simmer, covered, for 15 minutes. Mix rest of water with cornstarch and stir into meat mixture. Stir constantly as mixture thickens. Good served with hot rice. Serves about four bowhunters!



Doc's Breast of Venison Pig or Veal

- One breast of venison, pork or veal.
- Stuffing: 6-8 slices of white bread; Soak with water & squeeze out excess. Break apart with your hands.
- ♦ 2 eggs
- ♦ 1 tbsp. sage
- ♦ Salt & Pepper to taste

Beat eggs first, then place with above in a bowl

- ♦ 1 onion, sliced lengthwise
- ◆ 1 celery stalk, chop in small pieces (optional)




Saute onion & celery in butter with a little oil so butter doesn't burn. Let them Cool! Add to bread mixture & mix well. If you want, you can add dried cranberries, raisin or apples. Make sure pocket on your breast is open well. Rinse meat & pat dry. Stuff pocket with stuffing. DO NOT OVER STUFF as it will fall out when it cooks. Once you stuff it, pin it close.

Grease the bottom of a roasting pan with oil. Put meat in pan. Rub meat with olive oil all over. Season with salt & pepper. (Kosher salt works well, makes it a little crispy). Bake at 350 degrees F for about 1 ½ hours or till well browned. If you have extra stuffing, grease a dish & bake on the side. Don't cook as long as roast (30 minutes) Pour a nice Ginny Red or White and Enjoy!!!
