We all know we have a long road ahead of us with the anti-hunters in this state as we read in the papers every day and are already attacking the upcoming Bear season. I believe that it required a high level of dedication, professionalism and wet and sore knees with all the kids that came. We showed them the basic points of archery and how they could further pursue this fun and exciting outdoor activity and hopefully join the ranks of TANJ. As I stated before it rained the entire day but they kept on coming

through the gates until 3:00 PM. They both demonstrated what is achievable with practice and dedication to archery. TANJ would like to thank **John Zampini**, the Archery Chairman of the SCFGA for another great day. We appreciated the invite to their Second Annual Archery day and we already marked our calendars for next year and hope other TANJ members will come and help out.

On Saturday October 23rd TANJ co-sponsored the 3-D archery range at the Central Jersey Rifle and Pistol Club in Jackson for CJRPC Annual "Wounded Warriors" Day. Tom and Tyler Robinson of TANJ and of CJRPC spearheaded the Archery event for that day. Tom and Tyler brought all their own 3D targets and made all the moving targets used during the day. Many members and their organizations came to help out -Black Knights Bowbenders, Wa-Xo-Be, and TANJ & CJPRC. We arrived at 6:30 AM and set up all the targets on the range along with the safety zone and shooting lines. We spent many hours before and after the shoot and would like to thank all the members of all the clubs working as one organization. Many Wounded Veterans and their families gave thanks and appreciated what we did for them.

During the last few months, while shooting at the Black Knights Range, I found out that two young archers were in need of Archery equipment. They both come from single parent families and their mothers are out of work at the present time. TANJ along with the Gutyankers are in the process of donating all the equipment of bows, arrows & back quivers to these upcoming traditional archers that they will need to fulfill their dream. They both express an interest that they also want to learn to bowhunt.

All traditional bowhunters in NJ, stand up and be counted on your hard earned traditional deer harvest! I would like you to take a moment and look at the **New Jersey Fish and Wildlife Digest, August 2010. The 2010 Hunting and Trapping Issue**—with the Lab on the front cover .Please turn to **page 32**- look at the "Deer Harvest Results." If you look under "Harvest Numbers for the 2009-2010 Bow Season" by Type of Bow you will see under "Primitive" Fall Bow for last year season it states 165 deer taken by Primitive (Traditional) Bowhunters. Next to it under "Primitive Permit Bow Season" 91 deer and "Winter Bow Season" 54 deer. I do not believe that figure is accurate.

My reasoning is that when you go to your local certified NJ Deer Check Stations, which can also be a local deli,, hardware store or gas station, you are usually in a rush to get back to the woods to harvest that buck or on the way home to show your wall banger of a buck to your buddies that you shot with a stickbow. However, when the person at the check-in station asks your manner of taking deer, I believe many stickbow hunters simply state "bow". Consequently, whomever is behind the counter just checks off your deer under the first item that they see on the NJ state report card which is "Compound" since

this person might not know the difference between a compound or a longbow/recurve. I bet that they all know what a crossbow (cross-gun) looks like.

So starting today the next time you harvest a deer with your stickbow remember to tell them it's a "Primitive" kill and make sure they mark "Primitive." I wish they had the word "Original" on the list! Ha-ha. I hope the State will change the word "Primitive" to "Traditional" in the very near future. I hope that this will help us in correcting the numbers of the primitive (traditional) bowhunters harvest to where they should be and hopefully better than 0.01% of deer taken by a "primitive" traditional bow . Compound vs Recurve or Longow only!

Crossbows are a now a legal hunting weapon in New Jersey but to me its not a bow and they should have their own season. (just my two cents). I also love to shoot Black Powder as I do my stickbow and know that my 50 cal. Thompson Center smoke pole is not considered a shotgun either.

TANJ will again have a booth at the New Jersey Outdoor Sportsman Expo on January 13th-16th 2011. We need volunteers to man the TANJ booth for the 4-day event. Last year we had over 12 members come to help out and we spoke to many archers who want to switch back to the "traditional way." We will be sending around an email. Please if you can make some time and step up and help out, we need your participation. Those that wish to attend and help out please email Tom Robinson at bldtrailer@aol..com who will coordinate that TANJ event.

We will be having our first 2011 TANJ council meeting during the January Expo. on Sunday January 16th at 11 AM during the show. All members are invited to join us see what TANJ council meeting are all about and would love to hear your comments and suggestions. We also have elections coming up and hope you will step up and be counted. We are always looking for Council Members. Please send an email our Secretary to Katie Pachuta at dgchapelhill@verizon.net.

TANJ held a council meeting on Oct 25th,2010. We had a quorum with 8 council members in attendance. Some upcoming items we are looking at in 2011 are two annual member meeting a year. Next year dates for Whittingham will be Friday, April 29th -Sunday, May 1st, 2011. Save the date now! We will have a TANJ rendezvous on the first field as always. Look for our TANJ flag pole with our new yellow logo flag. We will also have a 10x20 white tent available for use to all members during the event. If anyone has any comments about last year's banquet and would like to see anything added or deleted (hope not) just send Kevin Grella an email. His email is on the inside front cover of the newsletter (page 2).

In closing, I would like to thank TANJ member George Sappah for stepping up as our new Treasurer and made my wife very happy. We also would like to thank Tom Robinson for stepping up as our new 3D Shoot Chairman along with Kevin Grella and Jim Farley serving on that committee. P&Y Founder Glenn St. Charles Passes

It is with sadness that the Pope and Young Club shares the news that our founder, Glenn St. Charles, has passed away.


Glenn St. Charles, passed away September 19th at his home in Seattle, Washington, after a short illness. He was 98.

"The Pope & Young Club wishes to extend our deepest sympathy to the St. Charles family. This is also a tremendous loss for the entire bowhunting community. The Pope & Young Club lost a father figure. The bowhunting community, shaped by more than five decades of Glenn's influence, lost a guiding force," said Pope & Young Club President Roger Atwood.

A bowyer from the 1940s when modern-day hunting with the bow and arrow was still in its infancy, St. Charles became a staunch and driven advocate for the sport. His vision for bettering the image of bowhunting and proving the effectiveness of the bow and arrow the very creation of the Pope and Young Club.was integral in the establishment of bowhunting seasons and the acceptance and popularity that bowhunting has since garnered. His work as Hunting Activities Chairman of the National Field Archery Association in the 1950s led to the development of the bowhunting records program, the subsequent founding of the Pope and Young Club in 1961, and the creation of a bowhunting ethical code and Rules of Fair Chase. His efforts and devotion to the cause of bowhunting spanned over eight decades. A legitimate iconic figure, St. Charles was one of the last true bowhunting pioneers.

M. R. James, President of the Archery Hall of Fame, and Past President of the Pope and Young Club, added "Glenn St. Charles will be remembered by many as a talented bowyer and founder of the Pope and Young Club. Rightfully so. But for his close friends and family, he will be fondly recalled a man who accomplished much more during a long and active lifetime. Father and father figure; fierce advocate and tireless defender of the sport he loved; pioneer bowhunter and visionary leader; outspoken conservationist; promoter of fair chase hunting; loyal friend and wise mentor; without question, Glenn St. Charles left his indelible mark on archery and bowhunting. He will be missed, but his place in our sport's rich history is secure."

We met at 8:30 A.M. to set up the BKB range for the day's event, which included putting out arrow backstops, target faces and 3D targets as well as setting up the bows, all the door prize and the kitchen for the day's event. Archery Archives

J. Maurice Thompson

James Maurice Thompson was raised on a Georgia plantation and first pursued a career in law. In 1871 he opened a law practice with his brother, William Henry Thompson. He was drawn away from that career by his success as a novelist. As a writer, Thompson became well known, his works ranging from local history to archery manuscripts. He published a successful compilation of his essays, *The Witchery of Archery*. Thompson wrote the poem "*To the South*" that was reprinted in George Washington Cable's influential and controversial essay, "The Freedmen's Case in Equity" in 1885. This poem expressed Thompson's reaction to the freeing of the slaves, and implied that some other Southerners were not as angry about the overturning of that institution as Northerners presumed.

When Thompson wrote The Witchery of Archery, he filled it with various stories, many of which were humorous. However, it also gave practical advice on the sport, such as the manufacturing of archery paraphernalia and how to use the equipment while hunting.

The Witchery of Archery was accredited for returning the sport of archery to public interest. Some of this was due to rifles bringing back bad memories of the American Civil War. By 1880, with the book less than two years old, patents relating to archery items greatly increased. More than any other book, The Witchery of Archery led to the increased interest in archery for the next half-century.

A year after The Witchery of Archery was published; Thompson was selected as the first president of the National Archery Association, largely due to the book.

"So long as the new moon returns in heaven, a bent beautiful bow, so long will the fascination of archery keep hold of the hearts of men."





Old School Archery Article #5 – Gleaned by Ray Tareila

This issue, we are going way back to one of the finest, how-to, deer hunting books ever written. Even Teddy Roosevelt who wrote some great hunting books himself said no hunter can afford to be without this book. I also remember reading an article by Gene Wensel who also highly recommended finding the book. It is entitled "The Stillhunter" by Theodore S. Van Dyke. It was first published in 1882 from a series of sporting magazine articles. The book was an expensive classic until Stackpole Books republished in 2004 and it is available today.

Van Dyke was a Jersey boy, born in New Brunswick and educated at Princeton. He started roving his 20 acres and all the continuously adjoining farmland when he was 8 and after receiving his law degree moved to Minnesota where he practiced law and became a State Congressman. But more importantly he roved and hunted the woods of Minnesota and western Wisconsin for months at a time and learned by observation and questioning Sioux while visiting their teepees. Illness forced him to move to southern California where he lived off the land for many years and later entertained, on his ranch, many prominent hunters like Teddy Roosevelt and John Muir.

Today's article is taken from parts of the chapter on "Looking for Deer Lying Down" which could be interesting and relevant for those hunting the woods of NJ.

"When entirely undisturbed by man deer will lie down in the daytime as they do at night—almost anywhere. But even then they show a decided preference for the following kinds of ground:

- 1. The points and backs of ridges especially if brushy.
- 2. The brushy heads of little ravines and hollows.
- 3. Windfalls and choppings, especially when old and brushy.
- 4. Thin thickets containing fallen logs or trees.
- 5. Heavy thickets without fallen logs or trees.
- 6. Patches of heavy fern or willow in little valleys.
- 7. Little plateaus, knobs, or terraces on hillsides. And in open country:
- 1. The long grass or heavy weeds of sloughs or swales.
- 2. The brushy edges and center of patches of scrub timber (sounds like S. Jersey pines)
- 3. Hillsides with scattered trees or bushes.
- 4. The bottoms of gullies and shady ravines with side pockets connected to them.
- 5. Brushy basins and brushy bottoms of creeks and rivers.
- 6. The shade of big rocks.
- 7.Bare ground under a tree on a hillside, ridge or in a valley, lying there like cattle.

If little disturbed they will not generally go far from their feeding ground or watering place to lie down. It is only in very high and quite dry mountains that deer will go 5 miles or up 5000 feet from their feeding place. Only flies, heat and other causes will make them travel far.

Much hunting is, however, almost sure to drive them farther

back, to make them take the thickest brush and the highest ground. They are apt, too, to go farther back about the full of the moon, though I find the moon makes little practical difference about the distance deer go back. It affects more the time

In winter deer are quite certain to lie in the sun. In summer they are quite as certain to lie in the shade. In autumn they often do both, lying in the sun during the cool part of the morning (though they are more apt to *stand* in the sun), and changing to the shade when it becomes warm. They seldom lie down where they will be disturbed with noises that make them get up often and look, such as wagons, cattle etc. Yet they care nothing for the plain noise of people if it be distant.

Just where and when a deer may be expected to lie down it is, of course, impossible to say. Like many other kinds of game, they are provokingly irregular in their habits, and do not appreciate your kindness in picking out nice lying places for them. but prefer to make their own selection. If you cannot track, you can only travel on, on over such ground as is above described and have patience until something starts.

The same caution that was needed before (in previous chapters) must be still observed. In regard to noise from your feet you must even be more cautious than when looking for moving deer since they will hear noise from your feet more readily when lying with head near the ground than when standing. A deer lies generally with his head up and sometimes with it laid over to one side; but in either case is nearly always listening and watching. Occasionally a deer falls in the daytime into a light doze, and once in a while you may get very close to one before he springs. And even if he were sound asleep it would not allow of any carelessness in approaching him. His senses are not to be trifled with in any circumstances

Sometimes it is quite easy to see a deer while in bed; as where they are in timber or open, bluffy country with little heavy brush, but with snow on the ground and the country rolling enough to allow you to get well above them so as to look down upon them. At such times every dark-looking oval spot, no matter how much it may resemble a stump, requires close inspection. And even on ground where deer can be seen you must strain your eyes to the utmost, for it is even then no easy matter to see one in bed.

Very rarely does a deer lie twice in the same bed although lying for several days on a piece of a few acres. Though deer keep for years in the same orbit of a mile or so in diameter, they change their special whereabouts so often that as a rule it will never be worthwhile to hunt around old beds". Ray's Comments: So this small part of this thick book provides a lot to consider. The author does not mince words so everything he says has validity from his years of observations and note taking. I can attest to the validity of the author's advice.

When I lived in Bethlehem Twp, Hunterdon County, I hunted out the back of my home which was half way up a 900 foot "mountain."

There was a small shelf about three quarters up the steep mountain which I discovered three years after hunting that mountain. It was a perfect hideout for deer surrounded by trees and thick brush. But the shelf was almost bare save for some one to two foot rocks strewn about. I discovered this sweet spot accidentally by peering up at a certain spot which was the only place where you could see it from below while scouting in the summertime. The lay of the land prevented you from seeing it from above. The deer used it as an afternoon siesta area before going down to feed in the cornfields below. The prevalent NW winds of hunting season prevented an uphill stalk because of swirling and the only way you might get lucky was to sneek in about 11AM and wait down wind for the afternoon siesta time.

Van Dyke's number 7 and 13 above describe this area. The point is whether you still hunt or treestand hunt, examining your plot in detail will provide the best chance to see and get a shot at deer. The mind is still the best computer. Enter the topography, wind, moon phase, feed availability and season. If all these compute, your chances of bagging a deer are substantially increased.
