

### The legendary Dick Mauch...

Dick Mauch was born in 1926 in Bassett, Nebraska As a youth, Dick worked in his family's hardware store, lumber yard and implement dealership. Dick was interested in flying, so In 1944 he graduated from high school, enlisted in the Navy and went to aviation school. After World War II, he attended the University of Nebraska at Lincoln and continued his passion for flying by acquiring a private plane.




Dick had been heavily involved

with the Pope & Young Club since its inception and was among the first P&Y measurers. He also established the "Ishi Award" for P&Y. He served as Records Committee Chair (1966-1972), Executive Secretary (1968-1972), and organized the 1964, 1969 and 1972 Banquet & Awards Programs. He served on the Book Editorial Committee for the first edition of the record book, published in 1975. In 1973, Dick was bestowed with Lifetime Honorary Senior Membership in the P&Y Club, only the second member to be so honored.

In 1961, Dick visited Fred Bear at the Bear Archery Plant in Grayling, MI. Dick planned to hunt the famous Little Delta, Alaska area where Fred and Glenn St. Charles hunted in the late 1950s. Dick became a Bear stockholder and went to work for Bear as a regional salesman with an 11-state territory around Nebraska. Dick helped with the development of several Bear Archery products. He is the last surviving member of the original six individual Bear Archery Company Stockholders.

Dick hunted with Fred on several trips and hosted many trips for Fred and other Bear employees near Bassett, NE for mule deer, whitetails, and turkeys. He hosted many celebrity bowhunters at the famous Plum Creek cabin, a favorite hunting haunt of Fred Bear's. In 1961, Dick hunted Grizzly Bears in British Columbia with Fred Bear, Charlie Kroll, and Bob Munger. On that hunt, Dick and Bob Munger survived a charging Grizzly Bear thanks to a well-placed shot by Bill Love that stopped a large wounded bear less than 15 feet from the two bowmen.

Dick has served as an Elector for the National Archery Hall of Fame. On March 5, 2011, Dick received the Bowhunter of the Year Award from the Nebraska Bowhunters Association. He was also honored as the second inductee into the Nebraska Archery & Bowhunting Hall of Fame. Dick was Nebraska's first bowman to be granted Honorary Membership in the Nebraska Traditional Archers. Dick's decades of contributions to Traditional Archery in Nebraska are second to none.




### Adopted from the movie: "The Restless Spirit"

We find an unpredictable creature called a bow's first bow, we find an unpredictable creature called a bowhunter. They come in assorted sizes, but they all have the same creed: To spend as much time as possible, outdoors. Bowhunters are found nearly everywhere—stalking around swamps; sneaking through briar patches; and scouting deer tracks a month before the season opens.

Mothers love them; sweethearts can't understand them; the boss envies them; and heaven protects them. When you are busy working, the bowhunter is thinking of lonely trails in the countryside painted with autumn leaves. When you want him to make a good impression, all he can talk about is fletching an arrow and his favorite bow. A bowhunter is a funny guy. In the woods he will happily eat last year's candy bar and drink from any mountain stream. But at home, his wife pampers his stomach. He likes long weekends, buckskin jackets, old apple orchards, logging roads, unposted land and questionable companions who are also hunters.

Without thought of race, creed or color, he likes people who hunt with arrows three months a year and talk about it twelve. Nobody else is so early to rise or so late to dinner. Nobody else can cram into one pocket, an extra bowstring, waterproof matches, insect repellant, a bottle of buck lure, a faulty compass, a can opener, a red handkerchief, and two chocolate bars.

A bowhunter is an instinctive creature. You know where he is in the spring and summer, but he's hard to find in the fall when he's overcome by that primitive urge to roam free in the foothills and swamps with the hope of just one clear shot. To chase game with the ghosts of other hunters from other times—that's all he really asks.








### Happy Ending to the "Lost Bow" story!

### **Bowhunting Legend Jim Dougherty Passes**

B owhunting lost a true legend on September 21, 2015. Jim Dougherty passed away after a long battle with cancer. Jim Lived in South Pasadena, California from his birth in 1936 until the early 1970s. He died in Tulsa, Oklahoma, his home for decades.



Jim had a passion for archery and outdoor writing. His father bought him an old lemonwood bow and some arrows when he was just 9 years old, a simple gesture that changed the course of Jim's life.

A world class bowhunter, past president of the Pope & Young Club and gifted writer, he bowhunted in many US states, Canadian provinces, Mexico and Africa. He began bowhunting deer in the southern California foothills. Later he pursued mule deer in places like Arizona's Kaibab Plateau, Nevada's Ruby Buttes, southern Utah, and Wyoming.

Jim was inducted into the Archery Hall of Fame in 1997. His many accomplishments included: National Bowhunter Education Foundation Board Member; American Archery Council President and Vice-President; Archery Manufacturers and Merchants Organization Board Member; International Bowhunters Organization Board Member; Safari Club International Bowhunters Vice-President; Archery Incorporated President and Vice-President; National Archery Museum Board Member; California Bowmen Hunters and State Archery Association Vice-President; Bear Archery Bowhunting Council Chairman; Professional Archer of the Year 1977; California Archery Hall of Fame 1984; International Bowhunters Clinic Hall of Fame 1992; Safari Club International Bowhunters Hall of Fame




1993. Though Jim was a giant in our industry, he was even more proud of being a husband, father and grandfather.

### Honoring Aimee E. Hrehowsik




I set out for a morning vigil on my first bowhunt in New Jersey in the first week of November 2000. I was using some treestands placed by a buddy of mine who invited me to hunt the local whitetails in the patch. Not long after settling in to the seat, I was ready, bow in hand with my lower bowlimb tip rested on my boot, arrow nocked and ready for action. Ahhhh, archery deer hunting in November!

Then, from out of nowhere, a Bluejay flutters down and lands on the shaft of my Easton Legacy 2018 arrow! What the...!!! I froze. "This camo must work pretty well", I thought "but...when will he figure me out?" He shuffled sideways back and forth on the shaft like he was linedancing. Billy Ray Cyrus's "Achy Breaky Heart" sounded off in my head...."Oh, Don't tell my heart, My achy breaky heart, I just don't think he'd understand...."

I finally broke out and said "Hey Jay!" expecting him to jump out of his plumage. He just tilted his head and kept on doing the boot-scoot boogie! I'm amazed at his tolerance of me. So, now I slowly reach up to see if he'll perch on my hand but he just walks the plank out towards the arrow tip out of reach. I lowered my arm and he scoots back toward me. Every time I reached up toward him, he shuffled out toward the tip and every time I lowered my arm, he'd scoot back toward me.

Never had I experienced such entertainment on stand! But it wasn't until I climbed down for lunch that it dawned on me something was just not right here. Sure, he flushed off the arrow as I went to stick it back in my bow quiver. But as I got down, unhooked the bow from the haul rope and stood up, I feel something land on my hat. Looking at the ground I see my shadow and the shadow of a Bluejay perched on my noggin. As I tilt my head up and down in a bobbing rythym, he dances on.....Now, I can't get Brooks and Dunn out of my head..."Heel - toe - docey -do c'mon baby let's go boot scootin'....Cadillac, black jack, baby meet me out back, we gonna boogie!"


Later that evening I told my buddy the story and find out from him that there was a bird rehabilitation facility nearby and that Bluejay was likely a released bird from that Rehab. Joint. He was probably fed by hand for along time there so now - to the bird, people equals food! I asked "But how did they teach him to line dance!!"

A cozy little hunting cabin located in the rural NW corner of the Nebraska Sand Hills is a very special place indeed. This cabin near Basset, NE hosted many archery greats in its time. Hunters like Fred Bear, Earl and Ann Hoyt, Ann Clark, Ted Nugent, Glenn St. Charles and many more hunted there. Some 12 Archery Hall of Fame inductees hunt there over the years.



Plum Creek flows across the front of the cabin not far from the structure. The cabin interior is laden with mementos from these famous guests including signatures, arrows, bows, and other items left behind. Heavy denim privacy curtains separating bunks bear the signatures of these visitors. In fact, Dick Lattimer started that tradition in 1982 when he took a marker and signed his curtain. After Fred signed his, it became "Fred's bunk" and this place would become Fred Bear's secret hunting hideaway.



Signatures grew to include those of Ted Nugent, Earl and Ann Hoyt, Glenn St. Charles, Rob Keck, Ben Lee, and others. While some of them have passed the memories and signatures at Plum Creek remain.

Dick became a Bear stockholder and went to work for Bear as a regional salesman with an 11-state territory around Nebraska.

Fred Bear first hunted at Plum Creek back in 1963 and again in 1964 with Ed Bilderback (Captain of the Valiant Maid), Bob Kelly, Dr. Judd Grindell, K. K. Knickerbocker, Bob Munger and Mike Steger. He returned to hunt in Bassett in 1975 with Bob Kelly. The old Bear Archery gang had been hunting here since the fall of 1976.

Dick Mauch had purchased some land along Plum Creek for them to hunt on that had caught Fred Bear's eye. Fred encouraged Dick Mauch to build a cabin on it.

He sent Dick a book "Your Cabin in the Woods" with Fred Bear's inscription on the inside front cover: "To Dick Mauch - Rushed out to get this so that we can have a first class bunkhouse. I don't go for this roughing it and hope you can locate the affair between close up trails of big deer coming to the canyon at daybreak. Need large windows facing the trails and high ceilings for bow clearance. Fred Bear, 1978."

Dick Mauch hosted many hunting rips for Fred Bear, Bob Kelly, Dick Lattimer and other Bear Archery employees near Bassett, NE where they hunted for mule deer, white-tailed deer and turkeys. The cabin at Plum Creek would become the home away from home for quiet, relaxed hunting retreats for Dick Mauch, Fred Bear, Bob Kelly, Dick Lattimer and the many guests they hunted with without having to worry about catering to others.


Dick Lattimer, who in 1966 became Bear Archery's head of advertising and promotion, was the first to sign his name on the brand new Cabin's denim curtains when he came with Fred and Glenn St. Charles for a spring turkey hunt in May, 1982. Dick decorated his spot on the curtain with the Bear Archery logo, in black and green. Each succeeding trip he would add the dates of month and year on his curtain: Oct. 1982 (with Fred and Glenn); 1st of May, 1984 (spring turkey hunt with Fred); 2nd May, 1985; Fall Hunt 1989 with Kelly's






In 1982, Fred Bear had shot an arrow into the exterior of the cabin adding a unique memento to the cabin's story.

After Bear Archery's divestment in their bowstring operations, Bassett became the new home for the manufacture of Bear Archery bowstrings. Dick Mauch and some local investors forged their partnership and began operations in Dick's fathers' old International Harvester implement dealership building in 1978. And thus was born "Cornhusker Archery" another legacy for Dick Mauch. But, of all his accomplishments, I'd bet that Dick Mauch's many memorable hunts at Plum creek are foremost in his memory banks to this day.

## The Commemorative Bear Super Kodiak

By 1988, the year of Fred Bear's passing, the Bear Archery catalog showed only four traditional bows in its pages. Of course, Fred Bear's passing was only coincidental to the decline in marketing of traditional bows. In fact, this era became known as the low point of traditional archery - not only at Bear Archery, but likely the archery community as a whole. That would slowly turn around starting in the early 1990s.

In 1997, the Bear Archery traditional line exploded to 10 models. By the end of the decade a series of Commemorative Bows were launched, celebrating Fred Bear's 100th birthday. The **Commemorative Fred Bear Super Kodiak** was made in very limited numbers (only 1,000) and offered in 1999. These followed the reintroduction of the "Super Kodiak" in 1996, which had been out of production since 1976 (excepting a short run of "Kodiaks" in the mid-1980s).

The elegant, 60-inch Super Kodiak was close to Fred Bear's heart, because he based his classic takedown recurve on its



timeless design. These Commemorative Fred Bear Super Kodiaks were made to the specifications of the original 1960s models. The lean laminated brown & black hard rock maple riser with angled rosewood accent stripes was capped on the back with black and white glass



**Commemorative bow set** accents. A padded Fred Bear bow case with leather side patch (1999 limited edition, limited supply) accompanied the bow. These Super Kodiaks were sold individually or as a matching set, with matching serial numbers that included the Super Kodiak (1999), Montana (2000) and Super Magnum 48 (2001), all with certificates of authenticity and lined bow cases. Intended for the collector, collector-sales were actually disappointing for the company and resale values never seemed to materialize but as time passes that may change! In future issues, read the history of the Bear Kodiak Hunter and Kodiak Magnum...



## Venison Recipes

## Venison Goulash

### **Ingredients:**


1

- 2 lbs. venison chunks
- 2 Tbsp. instant beef bullion3 Tbsp.
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 16 oz. can stewed tomatoes
- 1 16 oz. can corn niblets
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 chopped onion
- 1 tbsp. paprika
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. thyme
- 1 cup sour cream
- 3-4 cups hot medium size egg noodles cooked
- water

Remove all fat from venison chunks and place meat in a crock pot. Cover meat with water, add bullion and bay leaf. Cover and simmer for 1-2 hours or until meat shreds easily with fork. Add water as needed to ensure meat isn't cooking dry. (liquid level should be down to ~1 cup when done). Discard bay leaf and shred meat with forks. Add remaining ingredients except for sour cream and

noodles. Stir to mix and cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Stir in sour cream and heat for 5 minutes but do not boil. Serve meat over hot noodles. Serves 4-6.
